

A Legend Leaves Campion

After thirty-three years of faithful, generous service to Campion, Brother Robert F. Daley, S.J., has been appointed by Very Reverend Joseph Sheehan, S.J., Provincial of the Wisconsin Province, to a position with the Jesuit Seminary Guild in Milwaukee.

Bro. Daley, as he has been affectionately known to two generations of Campion Alumni, came to Campion as Registrar in September, 1938, and served in that capacity since that time. As Registrar he was responsible for such things as school records, report cards, student transcripts to colleges, student insurance, and academic reports to the North Central Association.

He also supervised the switchboard. But these descriptions somehow miss the endless nitty details of the daily operation of the school that were his responsibility. Nor does his work alone adequately describe his impact on the school. He provided experience and continuity through fourteen principals and seven presidents, reminding with an occasional note or question new administrators about routine but unwritten procedures they might otherwise miss.

But more important he reached the students — through personal contact in his work, through conversation, and in earlier years through the many hours he spent with them on the handball court. He took a personal interest in students while they were here and maintained that interest long after they graduated. He knows and has kept in touch with more alumni than anyone on the staff. For years he has been to many alumni returning to campus the familiar face that brings back so many warm memories.

When Edmund Campion was being canonized last year, Brother Daley was the logical representative from Campion to attend the ceremonies in Rome. Father Lucey asked him to go. Alumni and friends throughout the country sent contributions to cover his travel expenses.

On Sunday, October 31, the Campion faculty and friends gathered for a Mass, followed by a farewell reception in Hoffman Lounge. Over the years Brother Daley made many friends in Prairie du Chien. His daily visits around town, popping in for ten minutes here and there, made him known to everyone. The alumni of St. Mary's are as fond of him as Campion alumni, because he frequently attended their plays and socials and took a personal interest in them and their families. For the last three years he worked with the retarded children and adults at the local Personal Development Center. As a token of their appreciation for his friendship and service to the local

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Goal For Annual Fund Set At \$160,000

Under the direction of Mr. Thomas McErlean, General Chairman, the 1971-72 Annual Fund Drive officially got underway with a luncheon for co-chairmen of the Parent's Division at Campion on Saturday of Homecoming Weekend. Fr. Gregory F. Lucey, S.J., and Mr. Edward McGavock, Chairman of the Parent's Division, were on hand to outline the program for this year's campaign. A week later there was a similar gathering at a dinner for co-chairmen from the Chicago area.

The goal for this year's Annual Fund has been set at \$160,000. This is the amount over tuition and other income needed to balance current operating expenses. The reserve funds that covered operating deficits of the last four years have been exhausted. So it has become imperative that Campion run on a balanced budget this year. Tuition is \$2370; the cost per student is \$3275. Even with the Jesuit contributed services and income from auxiliary enterprises such as the basketball

On Nov. 3rd the Campion community participated in the nationwide Fast to Save a People. The general goal of the day was to become more aware of and sensitized to the sufferings and needs of the people of East Pakistan.

About 50 person fasted for the day, and in the evening a Rap Mass was held. At the Mass students and teachers reflected on the day and tried to place it in perspective with their lives at Campion and their concern for one another. There was general agreement on the need for each individual to come to grips with the question of world suffering and his actions. Several people spoke of the growing concern for one another at Campion and its good effects.

Letters were sent to the various parents' organizations explaining what students and teachers were hoping to achieve through the day's experience, and a request was made for a contribution to the relief fund. The donations for the fund totaled \$100 from the Campion community and it is hoped this figure will be matched.

A critic might note that 50 participants is only $\frac{1}{8}$ of the total student body, or that \$100 is only 25c per man. But the fact that those 50 were willing to fast, or that students were willing to donate \$100 worth of cigarette money shows that students are becoming aware and sensitive to the world around them.

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Excerpts From "The Faith of Our Children"

Religious observance among teenagers or the lack of it is a question frequently raised by concerned parents and alumni. It is an issue that we as Christian educators work to face daily. In the Spring, 1971 issue of *FORDHAM*, Father James J. DiGiacomo, S.J., and Professor Edward A. Wakin discuss this problem. I thought you might enjoy reading some excerpts.

Gregory F. Lucey, S.J.

Of all the parental footsteps that children no longer follow the hardest to bear is rejection of the parents' faith. Free choice is now taken for granted where friends, interests, dates, activities and careers are concerned. Parents can even take religious intermarriage in stride. But time and again concerned, believing parents introduce the painful issue that their children have rejected the religious faith they were born to.

This kind of rejection is increasing and causes much confusion and anguish. Parents want to know how to confront the crisis of faith in their teen-agers' lives. This strikes home.

Unless Christianity is presented in its true light as a human revelation rather than as a custodian of middle-class values, it is not surprising to see what so often happens today. Those young people most inclined to creativity and initiative will find organized religion most constraining, those who have learned best how to think and act for themselves will feel the growing-up necessity of disposing of God and religion.

Young people need to see God not just as someone who is interested in keeping them in line and out of trouble, but as someone who calls on them to fulfill their best instincts. He is the God who denounces prejudice, who calls for generosity and concern for the poor, the God who denounces war and violence, the God who summons them to compassion and concern. This kind of God appeals to idealistic young people in a very positive way. This kind of religion appeals to adolescents, not as a force that limits them, but rather as a call to become their best selves.

But let's face it. Do most Christian parents worry as much about their teen-agers exhibiting racism or social apathy as much as they worry when these same young people fail to attend Mass or announce they have given up praying or question Christian doctrine? When adults worry only about teen-age failure to conform, to worship, and to pray and when they fail to show a corresponding concern about failure to show compassion, to demonstrate a concern for justice and to renounce prejudice, the message comes through loud and clear to teen-agers: religion is really about the childhood virtues, it really does limit the person, it narrows perspective, and fails to bring out the finest human qualities.

To religious educators, a discouraging and disturbing pattern is evident among many Catholic teen-agers who honor their outward religious duties. They are often guilty, at the same time, of apathy and prejudice. Those teen-agers who get to the church on time and regularly are likely to show less social responsibility than those who are rebelling against organized religion by staying away.

This pattern reflects what religious psychologists have found among adults who are duty-bound, faithful churchgoers; they are commonly guilty of prejudice and social indifference. They are Christians by convention rather than commitment. Only where commitment takes hold is the witness truly Christian; then the individual transcends narrow parochial prejudice and indifference. Many a teen-ager blames organized religion for the failure of practicing Christians to practice Christianity. Many teen-agers see religion opposed to their best instincts. And when they make what they see as an either-or choice it is frequently in favor of their best instincts.

Parents can confront these patterns of adolescent religious rejection if they try to confront the meaning of religion in their own lives. Adults must examine carefully their own understanding of God and of the place religion plays in their lives and in the lives of their children. If they see religion as mainly something for children and as a useful social tranquilizer, then they can expect teen-age rebellion against religion. Adults must resist the temptation to use God in the losing battle for adult convenience and control.

Adults also must recognize the difference in teen-age response to faith and to God. The God who is "up there" or "out there," who inspires a sense of awe and mystery, is not the God of the Age of Aquarius. Adults feel comfortable with God as the supreme outsider; teen-agers tend to respond to God as the supreme insider. In theological terms, teenagers have trouble responding to the transcendence of God. At the same time, they respond to another aspect of the Divine, which is less real to their elders. That is God's immanence. Teen-agers perceive God as a deeply personal reality at the very heart of existence, identified with the very heartbeat of the universe. Many teen-agers who sound atheistic are very much attuned to this dimension of the Divine, one that often has escaped their elders.

Adults must respect this need of young people to find their own way of expressing the Divine in terms that are different and distinctive to them. Of course, believing Christians must try to insure fidelity to the authentic Christian message, but with respect for the teen-ager as serious searcher. Teen-agers need the opportunity to search out the ways in which they can express the Gospel in their own lives. Adults confronting teen-agers need always to remind themselves that the goal is not so much conformity but commitment to the faith of their parents.

Chicago Mothers Host "Fur Fling"
