### Approve Senior Projects

The German philosopher Arthur Schopenhauer once said, "Every man takes the limits of his own field of vision for the limits of the world." To combat the narrow vision a theoretical education often fosters, this spring about twenty-five seniors plan to participate in various projects with the intention of applying the theoretical knowledge attained in the last seven and one-half semesters to various practical situations.

The exact length and nature of each project has been left to the discretion of the participating seniors, provided that parental permission is obtained and that the project has been approved by both the project's faculty advisor and by the three-member review board. The areas of predominate interest include: education, race, subcultures, law, attitudes, poverty and pollution. Locations of the various projects range from New Orleans, Appalachia, and Alton, Ill., to San Francisco, Chicago, and Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

On completing the field work for the project, participants will submit reports to the review board.

The physics lab has four Air-Tracks in experimental use as well as a Lasar utilized in the research optics. Sponsored by the department are numerous other study programs for Campion Knights with scien-

tific interests to choose from including astronomy, rocketry with practical experiments, electronics and photography. Introduced also is the Harvard Project in Physics available to freshmen students.

Students conduct their numerous experiments in the physics lab amid soothing strains from music of Tschaiikowsky and other great music masters. The originator of background music in the classroom is Vern Gunderson, a former physics instructor at Mason City High School, Mason City, Ia. In 1965 he was honored as the "outstanding physics teacher in the state of Iowa." Mr. Gunderson states, "Music is relaxing, conducive to thought process and kills the dead silence found in the ordinary classroom."

Mr. Gunderson has recently been appointed a consultant by Rolland E. Wilson of the Public Relations Dept., Wis. Power & Light Co., in organizing science seminars throughout the state. Vern Gunderson is one of 30 physics teachers in the United States recently selected by Harvard University to take part in a special summer institute from June 29 to Aug. 14 at Cambridge, Mass. The title of master teacher was recently conferred on Gunderson by Harvard University for his outstanding contributions in the field of science-education.

## A New Generation?

"Today's youth" — what images does that conjure up in your mind? Long hair, rock, rebelliousness, sexual license, disrespect, drink, drugs, noise?

Or do you see today's youth as well-educated, articulate, concerned about important issues, the clear hope of a bright future?

Would you say, perhaps, that today's youth is neither much better nor much worse than youth at any other time, not really any different, in fact, though manifestations of typical adolescent awkwardness, rebelliousness and idealism are taking new forms?

One can, of course, generalize on the ordinary psychology of adolescence, and indicate many characteristics that have been typical of adolescents throughout history. The awakening of emotional awareness, the development of sexual power and interest, the need of finding and asserting one's identity, with accompanying striving for independence — these are familiar changes, and they result in familiar behavior patterns and familiar needs. If that were not so, the role of parents and teachers would indeed be confusing.

At the same time, it is very important to give consideration to the cultural context within which this growth occurs. It is common knowledge that the environment within which a person grows is far more influential in shaping him than are the hereditary or innate traits.

The fathers of Campion seniors, for instance, are fairly commonly men in their forties and fifties. Their childhood and adolescent development was influenced largely by the situation in the country during the twenties and thirties. This involved the tremendous upheaval of the depression years, prohibition, the "gangster era," the increased social involvement of government during the Roosevelt regime, the development of Nazism and the second World War. It saw the main growth of radio broadcasting, much of the early development of airplanes, and of sound motion pictures.

Fairly commonly these men experienced the drive to "upward mobility," to getting a considerably greater degree of education than their parents, moving into a business or professional career from a family where the father was a tradesman, moving from a city home to one in the suburbs.

The sons of these men have had a very different environment. It is true that we adults experience the same things in the world about us that our children do, but we experience them as adults, with our personalities and values already formed. The child experiences them in the process of basic formation, and without any previous experience to compare them with.

Consider something of the environment a Campion senior has experienced. He was born in 1952, by which time his family had their first TV set. Watching it has occupied a total of half again as many hours as he has spent in classrooms. It has brought the world into his living room in a way that radio and newspaper never did — other cities, other countries, sophisticated advertising (in which sex appeal is used to sell everything from automobiles to toothpaste), violence both real and fictional, extremes of poverty and wealth. Years ago to encourage children not to waste food, mothers often said, "Think how a poor little Chinese kid would like to have what you have for supper." But the youngsters did not experience the Chinese and their hunger as real. Today the youngsters watch the starving children in Biafra, brought right in to the family room in living color, while their mother is in the kitchen preparing supper.

A young man not only reads about the war; he actually watches men killing and being killed in Viet Nam, where per-

haps his older brother is fighting — then gets dressed to take his girl out to a dance.

When a Campion senior was three the Montgomery bus boycott demonstrated the power of non-violent resistance to racial injustice. Through the whole course of his life he has been confronted with an awareness of this injustice, with the conflict brought right into his home on TV, with the sight of resistance to basic justice as well as to federal law by courts and civil authorities; he knows clearly the dreadful hypocrisy of those same authorities now crying for law and order. He has never experienced a United States in which demonstrations, both peaceful and violent, are not part of the daily scene.

When he was five, the Russians launched the first satellite, and the space age was born almost with the beginning of his consciousness of the world around him. Besides the rather amazing amount of scientific knowledge he has absorbed through magazines and television, the race for superiority in space gave great impetus to the drastic curriculum revisions and innovative educational procedures he encountered when he started school.

When he was six Pope Pius XII died. From the time of his preparation for First Communion, he has known, not the stable and "militant" Church of the last four centuries, the Church with clearcut answers, but the "pilgrim Church," the Church of ecumenism and social involvement, the Church of Pope John, Vatican II and its aftermath. Theological development and change of catechetical aims have led to a very different view of religion from that which his elders had at his age.

Throughout his life, the United States has been involved to some extent in the Viet Nam conflict. By the time he was 13, we had made a heavy commitment to active fighting in that war — a war not officially recognized by declaration, a war that comes into his living room in the daily TV news, while the country as a whole carries on the atmosphere of "business and pleasure as usual," except for the peace demonstrators whom his parents and friends generally look on as a danger to law and order.

(A mother told me about finding her 10-year old son crying in his bedroom one day. When she finally got him to tell her what was wrong, he said he had been watching the war on television and had realized that when he grew up, he, too, would have to go there to fight — and he felt bad because he didn't want to kill people. An America not involved in that war is outside his experience.)

For the most part, the Campion senior is aware only of the consumer role, not the productive role of society. His home is far removed from the world of work and it is surrounded by the supermarket, the leisure and pleasure oriented occupations, seen through the fantastic interpretation of advertising, the "Hidden Persuaders."

He reached physical puberty two years earlier than his father did. His sexual interest developed in a society in which sex is more explicit and more exploited than in any previous period of American history. At the same time, he faces a longer period of education before he reaches the level of professional competence he looks for; adolescence comes earlier today and is prolonged more than before.

These are merely a few of the more dramatic events and environmental changes that have occurred to affect the development of today's teenager. These experiences are quite different from those of a boy of the depression era. It would be most extraordinary, indeed, if youngsters from the two generations would end up with the same outlook and sense of values.

## Cagers Tie, CWCC Title

Campion's basketball team captured a tie for CWCC Championship for the first time in 12 years with an 11-3 mark and finished the regular season 15-5, the finest record this decade.

However, the Knights had their State Tournament hopes smashed in La Crosse when Eau Claire Regis won 50-42. In a very close contest Campion fell behind early 16-8, but the second quarter saw the Knights play great defense outscoring the Ramblers 11-2 and take a 19-18 lead. The score at halftime was 24-21 Regis.

The third quarter was a nip and tip period with Campion holding a 32-30 lead at one point. The fourth period opened with Regis up by one point. At 2:30 remaining Regis held a four-point lead and went into a stall. When the Knights got the ball their shooting-eye was off. Marty Schultz and John Schrup had 11 points apiece.

After the Christmas vacation the Knights traveled to Assumption where they lost their first conference game 60-48. Marty Schultz lead the team with 17 points as did John Schrup the following evening when Pacelli fell 45-40. Schrup and Roger Jerrick scored 19 and 15 points as Campion rallied to beat Aquinas 56-45 in La Crosse.

Back at home the Knights won the next three in a row. Four starters scored in double figures to trounce Columbus 80-57. Then a 62-55 win over Assumption avenged their only conference loss. Non-conference Sparta was trampled 68-34 in the finest defensive effort of the season. Tied for the CWCC lead with Regis, the Knights traveled to Eau Claire only to lose a close one 50-49. Now Campion needed help to win the title. Regis lost two road games as the Knights beat McDonell 63-46. At home the Knights finished the season undefeated rolling over Newman 56-42 and Pacelli 75-56. Assured of at least a share of the title, only a visit to Columbus remained. As fate would have it, the seventh place Dons upset Campion with a 44-40 victory. And, the Knights were forced to share the CWCC crown with Regis.

The top six players during the season were co-captains Roger Jerrick and Marty Schultz, and senior Mark Lappe. Underclassmen were guard John Schrup, center Bob Huber, and sophomore Jerry Simpson provided a great deal of help. Leading scorers were Schrup with 17 points per game and Jerrick and Schultz with 10 and 8 points respectively. In rebounds Jerrick dominated with 15 per game and Schultz and Huber had nine each.

For the second year in a row Campion captured the Swimming Championship for private schools in Wisconsin. The Knights won the meet at Wayland by 25 points over the second place team. Meet records were set by Tom Schindler, Bill Means, and Joe Egan. Kevin Washburn, and the freestyle relay team of Jim Meacher, Jay McKee, Scott Stupay, and Washburn set both meet and pool records.

Campion's swimming team off to a 2-1 mark before Christmas, raced to a 7-2 mark after the vacation to chalk-up a 9-3 mark for the season.

Breaking many records along the way, the Knights beat Sauk Prairie 78-17, Wayland Academy 2-0 on a forfeit, Tipton 68-27 and Rhinelander 48-47. A close 54-41 loss to Rochester Mayo gave Campion its second loss of the season.

The Knights trounced arch-rival Mar-

quette 63-32 and at the same time lost to seven-time Iowa champion Cedar Rapids Washington 63-32. To wind up the regular season Campion swam a perfect meet against Tipton, taking first and second in every event, and scoring an 84-36 margin.

Throughout the season, Father Kerrigan used many of the younger swimmers who came through very well. Two juniors, Kevin Washburn and Jim Meagher went to the National Catholic Swim Meet and finished in the top ten. A full team would have placed Campion in the top ten as a team. Next year's squad should be young but outstanding.

The highest scoring tankman for Campion was junior Kevin Washburn with 9.9 points per meet followed by Scott Stupay with 9.0, Bob Means 6.9, Chris Slaughter 5.6 and Tom Schindler 5.1 points per meet. The varsity team averaged 60.9 points out of 95 possible in each meet.

## Wrestlers Capture 8th Place At State Meet

In a rebuilding, the 1969-70 wrestling squad finished with a 6-6 dual meet record, third place in the CWCC, and eighth place at the state tournament.

Coach Nick Campbell was pleased with the fine finish. He said, "actually we placed higher in the state this year than last, and the young men were pleasant surprises."

At Christmas the Knights had a 2-3 record but posted a 4-3 mark since the holidays. At the Central Wisconsin Catholic Conference championships, Campion captured three division titles along with 74 points good for third place. Champs were seniors Tom Marten at 185, and Connie Kokonas at 115, and sophomore Ondre

Williams at 123. Senior Randy Maschek finished second at 155.

The following week Sectional Meets were held to qualify for the State meet. Campion finished third while qualifying six men. Marten and Kokonas again captured their division titles; Williams, and sophomore Jeff Paunicka finished second; senior Don Hudson took a third, and Mark Bannon finished fourth.

At the State meet in Milwaukee, Marten finished last in the finals to take a second place. Kokonas finished third and the remaining young men took at least one point each. Campion finished eighth behind a number of Milwaukee powers.
