Golden Anniversary Reunion Draws Five Alumni of Old Sacred Heart College Days

Gathering quietly over the June 22-24 weekend, a handful of graduates of the 1912 academy class and of the college class of 1915 met on campus to share memories, fill in almost 50 eventful years of personal history, and survey the muchexpanded physical capacity of their alma mater.

From Canton, Ohio, active Clarence E. Lang, whose boarding school days at Sacred Heart-Campion encompassed 1909-1915, joined equally active Clem A. Berghoff, whose school days were identified with his. Berghoff, of Wilmette, III., is manager of a restaurant at 17 W. Adams st., Chicago, and father of six children.

Lawyer J. Evans Barnett, Boscobel, Wis., judge advocate of the Wis. Dept. of the American Legion, a graduate of the former college division, was the remaining layman. He will retire soon, with his son, John E. '41, now practicing law in Chilton, Wis., returning to Boscobel.


Two Jesuit members of the former college class, Frs. Wm. F. Houser and Julian L. Maline, attended and celebrated Mass for their classmates. The former, at one time on the Campion faculty for many years, has been at Regis college, Denver, since 1944. The latter has been director of studies for the Chicago province since its formation.

NMSQTs Place School Near Top

Results of the National Merit Scholarship qualifying tests administrated Mar. 6 to the 128 members of the Class of 1963, next year's seniors, reveal extremely gratifying results. As a group, the class achieved a median rank in the 94th percentile. This means that the middle or 64th scholar of the class ranks in the top six per cent nationally among American high school juniors at the time of the test. Actually, 55 per cent rank in this group.


Of the 128 Campion boys, 23 are in the 99th or top percentile; 14 more in the 96th; 11 in the 94th; eight in the 92nd, along with 22 more in the 98th, 97th and 95th-for a total of 78 in the top eight per cent. Fourteen are listed in the 89th percentile and 16 others in the 84th or above for a total of 108, or 83 per cent of the class, in the top 16 per cent nationally.

The tests are geared to judge not only aptitude for college but also corresponding achievement.





New Athletic Center Rising in Steady Spring, Summer Building

During an unusually severe and protracted winter when much of the concrete work had been planned, construction on the new natatorium-gymnasium fell two months behind the projected schedule. However, favorable weather later in spring and in the first part of the summer has enabled workmen to proceed at an ideal pace.

In the first half of May the girders were positioned over the gym section and by the end of the month over the swimming pool. Concrete was poured for the pool basin in two operations June 12 and 14. Special protective treatment was given all steel used in the natatorium roofing.

In a testing July 5-6, 187,000 gallons of water were used to fill the concrete pool basin.

GYM FLOOR is poured in early stage of work. View is from south to north, length of varsity court. Meanwhile, the outer campus was renovated as new intramural fields were graded and seeded south of the golf course along the Burlington tracks. Fr. Eugene Zimmerman supervised the work and gave the grass its first cutting July 9.

Preparations to put in several new fairways and abandon at least Nos. 3 and 4 on the golf course were begun. The lower fields were also seeded for grass and have been cut several times.

The new varsity football and baseball fields underwent their third summer of care and will go into use in the coming school year. The new athletic center will swing into use during the basketball season. Finally, the Joyce Kilmer library has been repainted, its floor sanded and varnished, and a system of flourescent lights installed.


POOL BASIN has been poured in work of June 12-14. Deep section has 15-foot depth for future divers from high board.
